Well, the 45th Annual White Marlin Open is in the books and it was a recordsetter. This year, 382 boats competed for a record \$5,461,560 in award money. This is an increase of 29 boats and \$504,595 in payouts.

Although we saw an increase of 1 white marlin weighed this year (18 vs. 17), there were considerably more releases of white marlin (702 vs. 385) and blue marlin (56 vs. 34). Heading into the tournament, tuna fishing was slow and it reflected in the number hooked during the 5 days of fishing. Last year, 42 tuna were boated and this year only 14 ended up at the scale.

The White Marlin Division saw a unique situation when anglers on the "Underdog" and the "Weldor's Ark" both boated 83 lb. white marlin.

However, since the fish caught on the final day by Pascual Jimenez on the "Weldor's Ark" wasn't gaffed, it won the tiebreaker because the fish caught the day prior on the "Underdog" was gaffed. Both were hooked on tinker mackerel in the Norfolk Canyon. Earlier in the week, on the second day of the tournament, Bill Haugland on the "Lights Out" caught a 75 lb. white marlin on a trolled ballyhoo in the Baltimore Canyon and held on to win third place in the White Marlin Division.

One of the highlights of the week occurred on the first day of the tournament when the "Auspicious" arrived with an 881 lb. blue marlin caught in 1,200 fathoms outside the Wilmington Canyon. This was the 6th largest blue marlin



caught in the 45 year history of the White Marlin Open and was worth over \$900,000 in award money.

The other stunner was the 75.5 lb. yellowfin caught on the local boat, "Buckshot" that brought in a record \$924,936. This was the highest payout for a tuna in tournament history. The winning fish was caught Gary Stansberry on by Thursday while trolling a plug in the Norfolk Canyon. A day earlier, Charles Matatall caught a 73.5 lb. yellowfin that ended the event in 2nd place. The vellowfin, caught on the "Blinky IV" was hooked north of the Lindenkohl Canyon. Third place in the Tuna Division was won by the team on the "Brass Monkey" with a 71 lb. yellowfin caught on a ballyhoo in 30 fathoms outside the Hot Dog.

The Wahoo Division saw some final day excitement when local boat, "Over-Board" arrived with a 63 lb. speedster to jump into 1st place and win over \$115,000 in award money. Capt. Dustin Lorah said the wahoo hit a lure inshore of the Rockpile. Luckily, the anglers did a good job boating the wahoo since the lure broke sometime during the fight. Second place in the Wahoo Division went to the "Desperado" with а 58 pounder. Justin Ratcliff, captain of the "Desperado" gets an A+ for effort for driving the second place fish to Ocean City from Rudee Inlet, VA and

arrived only 6 minutes before the scales closed on Wednesday night.

Compared to last year, the Dolphin Division saw the largest increase in activity with 14 fish weighed versus only 2 in 2017. This years winner was a 50 pounder caught on the "Fin•Nominal" in 60 fathoms in the Poor Man's Canyon on the second day of the tournament. The 2nd place dolphin, caught by George Mess on the "Rigged Up" was also caught in the Poor Man's Canyon on a trolled ballyhoo. In 3rd place was a 36 lb. bull caught by Rob Overfield on the "Moxie Boys" while trolling a horse ballyhoo north of the Poor Man's.

Two heavyweights battled it out for Top Release Boat with the "Viking 72" edging out the "Billfisher", 875 points to 840 points. The "Viking 72" released 10 white marlin and a while blue marlin the "Billfisher" released 12 white marlin during their 3 days of fishing. The "Viking 72" split their time between the Norfolk, Washington and Spencer Canyons. The "Billfisher" hit the Washington Canyon on their first day of fishing and the Spencer Canyon on their remaining two days. This year was truly a family event on the "Billfisher" with 3 generations of Duffie's participating.

Overall, it was another exciting tournament. Hats off to the Motsko family and all of the volunteers who work very hard to put on a world class event! If President Trump keeps our economy cranking, there's no telling how big the tournament will be next year. We could be seeing our first \$1,000,000 tuna!



Outside of the tournament, flounder fishing continues to roll along with good catches coming in from anglers fishing in the bay and out on ocean structure.

In the bay, the best bite has been in the East Channel for anglers fishing with live spot or mullet. White Gulp Swimming Mullets are still producing for anglers choosing to fish with artificial baits, but this time of year, castnetting live bait will give you a definite advantage. Looking for deeper holes in the East Channel and around the Rt. 50 Bridge where the water is slightly cooler is a good idea right now. We also saw fish pulled out of the West Channel, south of the Rt. 50 Bridge and in the Fishbowl, which is located between the East and West Channels, north of the Rt. 50 Bridge.

Inshore structure continues to produce better catches than what we are seeing in the bay. The Bass Grounds, Russell's Reef and up north at the Old Grounds are all good summertime spots for targeting larger flounder. Anglers dropping Spro bucktails tipped with Gulp or strip baits do well when fishing structure or coral bottom off the coast. You will see what I mean when you read through this issue. It is loaded with pictures of good size flounder caught on ocean reefs and wrecks!

The other exciting news is that cobia are showing up in good numbers right off the coast of Delaware and are heading our way. They have been found cruising the surface or just under schools of bunker.

Anglers have had luck tossing them live eels (always a cobia favorite), live bunker or even bucktails tipped with Gulp Swimming Mullet. Just last Friday, John Burbage from Ocean View, DE caught a 79.4 lb. cobia to set a new Delaware state record. John was just a mile and a half off the Bethany coastline when he spotted some big cobia around a school of bunker. He tossed it a live bunker and fought the fish for over an hour before getting a chance to sink a gaff in it. John said that he saw a good number of fish in the area and they were moving south. Cross and Nicky Ferrara have also had good luck in recent weeks tracking down cobia right off our coast while fishing from their jet skis. Last weekend, they boated a couple more cobia after hooking them on live eels off the coast of Fenwick Island. We even saw a cobia caught and released last Friday by Chris Clasing while fishing with live bunker in the West Channel, south of the Rt. 50 Bridge.

Upcoming Tournaments

This weekend is the world famous Capt. Steve Harman's Poor Girls Open at Bahia Marina. Lady anglers will be fishing Thursday, Friday and Saturday with weigh-ins from 4:00 PM to 7:30 PM each day.

Right on the heels of the Poor Girls Open is the MidAtlantic tournament that starts on August 20th and runs through the 24th. Weigh-ins are each night from 5:00 PM to 9:00 PM at Sunset Marina.

I was talking with my mate Mr. Evans while we were getting rigged up for the White Marlin Open. He was rigging ballyhoo on O-rings and copper wire while I was twisting up mullets for a dredge teaser. We both have been fishing the White Marlin Open for over 30 years now and we were discussing how much bait rigging has changed over time.

Our boat cooler for the week consisted of several dozen small "dink" ballyhoo. Some were rigged to skip behind Squidnation Slammer chugger heads and others were rigged with a 3/8 ounce egg sinker to swim. We also had a teaser bait cooler that held "horse" ballyhoo behind assorted Island Lures to put behind our Squidnation squid chain teasers (I love the new shade of blue squids - and so did a white marlin on the first day!) and also forty or so chinweighted mullets for our left dredge teaser. A fair quantity of baits, but not much in the way of variety. Our best spread for white marlin fishing has become very simplistic.

The first White Marlin

Open I fished in as a mate was in 1986. My memory might not be one hundred percent accurate on the quantities, but I know it was jam packed with rigged squid, flying fish, mullets with hooks, double hooked eels, bonita belly strips, Spanish mackerel and of course, assorted sized ballyhoo. All were rigged on steel leaders that were between 18 and 25 feet long. Looking back, I am not sure how it wasn't a big tangled mess! Unlike the bait pattern behind the "Last Call" these days, the trolling spread was pretty complicated in the 80s. The left flat line was usually a mullet. The right flat was either a mullet or a squid. The right short rigger held a Spanish mackerel and the left was either a flying fish or a ballyhoo. The long riggers were strip baits or ballyhoo and the center rigger shotgun bait was the double hooked eel (whitey looked awful silly with one of those slimy suckers wrapped around his snoot!). For teasers we usually had a chain of "natural" colored rubber squid on the left side and a tandem of Mumford lures on the right (black and purple on the back and green and yellow in the front). Dredges were not yet in use (although they were being developed by some super secretive guys).

So what led to the big change? In my case it was a gradual evolution. The first key factor was better quality and diameter monofilament for leader material. Jinkai brand was one of the first that had a soft, yet durable mono that was suitable for natural baits. Stiff, thick, heavy mono was fine for lures but we needed something a little more forgiving for our baits. Jinkai was just the ticket. By 1990 my natural baits were almost exclusively on monofilament leaders.

The next big change was the size of the hooks and the baits. By the mid 90s things had downscaled tremendously. This was due in large part to traveling fisherman bringing back techniques from exotic locales like Isla Mujeres and Venezuela. Guys were putting up good numbers of billfish in these places using smaller, short shanked hooks on small to medium ballyhoo. My trolling spread in Isla Mujeres in 1997 was exclusively small swimming ballyhoo on 6/0 9175 Mustad J-hooks. Those hooks were roughly the same size, or maybe even slightly smaller than what I used for www.coastalfisherman.net

flounder in the 80s!!! And of course the dredge teaser had come into play by then so we were experimenting with different ways to attach massive amounts of mullets to umbrella rigs and spreader bars.

The ease of rigging ballyhoo on short shanked hooks and the success we were having slowly made sewing eels and squid a thing of the past for all but a few crews. Spanish mackerel were still a "go to" big bait but the bait coolers had mostly ballyhoo in them. Steel leaders were all but forgotten for marlin fishing.

In the early 2000s the biggest change occurred. Circle hooks. Legendary globe trotting Captain Ron Hamlin began promoting the use of circle hooks for billfish trolling in the late 90s, but it didn't take hold until the new millennium. Many of us were slow to change, but the federal government helped to make up our minds for us. A study was done on billfish mortality rate using J-hooks versus circle hooks. Twenty white marlin were released with satellite tags. Ten on circle hooks and ten on Js. I think the sample size and the release techniques were both ridiculous, but that is yet another conversation for another time. The fish released on circle hooks did significantly better than those

on Js and the NMFS/NOAA higher ups proposed a law requiring circle hooks in any tournament that had a prize for white marlin. We had to learn to fish circles then! I now embrace the circle hook system and use it any time I am marlin fishing. Everybody should.

I guess the question you might ask is whether we do better now than we did then. There is more competition on the water now, but the fish stocks seem very healthy. My favorite rigs from the 80s wouldn't see the light of day behind the "Last Call" in 2018, but we caught fish then and we catch fish now. I don't know. Maybe Mr. Evans and I will go retro one day before the end of the season and I will post the results! I wonder if any tackle shops have eels or flying fish in stock?

Already into the back half of August, this summer has really flown by, but there is still plenty of fishing left this season and from the looks of it, we could have plenty of good days ahead of us, especially for flounder and cobia.

Right now, the big news is the cobia bite off the Delaware Avid angler, John coast. Burbage of Ocean View, DE was out on Friday and found several good size fish cruising the surface around schools of bunker only 1.5 miles off the Bethany coast. John had caught some bunker earlier in the day, so he tossed one to a big fish and the fight was on. It took John, who is an excellent angler and was fishing alone, over an hour to get the fish to the boat and stick it with a gaff. The big "man in the brown suit" tipped the scale at 79.4 lbs.

The question is, "Does Delaware have a state record classification for cobia?" I guess it depends on who you ask, because when you look on their website there isn't a category for cobia, yet state representatives have told folks that they added one. They did send a person out to verify the weight of the fish so they perhaps will start recognizing the state record for cobia with John's fish.



On their rigged-up jet skis, Cross Ferrara and his dad, Nicky have had good luck tracking down cobia cruising the coastline 1.5 miles off Bethany Beach. Last weekend, both Cross (pictured) and his dad hooked good size fish while tossing live eels to fish found under schools of bunker.

We also saw cobia caught off the beach in Fenwick Island. One of Matt Shoup's customers at Fenwick Bait & Tackle reported catching a cobia on 2 consecutive days last week. I also received pictures from Nicky and Cross Ferrara, who like to fish for cobia from their rigged-up jet skis. They captured another two over the weekend while fishing with eels off the Fenwick coast.

From the multiple reports I have received, the cobia are following schools of bunker and are heading south. Some very big fish have been seen, so it

could be a perfect time to do a little searching. You won't have to go far, since it looks like they are mainly staying within 2 miles of the coastline. Fish have been caught on live eels, bunker and bucktails tipped with Gulp artificial baits.

At Rick's Bait & Tackle, Capt. Mike was excited about this weeks Paradise Grill Flounder Tournament that starts on Wednesday. This year, it is a 5day tournament and Mike said that the Spro bucktails have been flying off the shelf. Chances are the winning fish is going to come from "B" Buoy or

somewhere around the Old Grounds.

Capt. Mike said that the flounder bite has picked up on ocean structure with most of his flounder pounders forgetting about the bays and inlets and just heading out to "B" Buoy and the Old Grounds with Gulp, minnows and strip baits. Not only are flounder becoming more plentiful, but they are getting larger as well. Several fish over 5 lbs. were caught last week with a couple in the 7 lb. range and one reaching 8 lbs. On Sunday, Mike weighed a 7.2 pounder (26") that was the largest flounder to come into his shop this season. It was caught at the Old Grounds.

Anglers on the headboat, "Thelma Dale IV" out of Lewes, DE have caught some big flounder lately, led by Steve Kiibler's 8 pounder hooked with a strip bait on ocean structure.

Flounder fishing in the Indian River Bay has been decent but anglers have had to deal with a lot of throwbacks.

Mike said that croakers have started to show up on the south side of the Indian River Inlet and just outside by the can. Some of his customers also complained about how thick the hardheads were around Site 10 where they couldn't get their baits down to the flounder.

Mike's customers fishing in the Indian River Inlet also found short stripers mixed in with shad and snapper bluefish at night under the lights near the Coast Guard Station.



Triggerfish were also caught along the rocks by anglers using sand fleas for bait. A few triggers were also hooked at the Massey's Landing Pier.

In the back bays last week, anglers mainly caught croaker and spot on bloodworms or Fishbites.

At Fenwick Bait & Tackle, Capt. Matt reported kingfish in the Fenwick surf in addition to bluefish and loads of sharks. The good news is that there are some decent size bluefish mixed in with the snappers. A few surfcasters hooked into bluefish in the 18 to 20-inch range while fishing with meat.

Matt also said that the striper bite in the Fenwick Ditch has improved. Anglers who were mainly catching small fish when they finally showed up are now seeing fish in the 30-inch range interested in their offering of live eels.

Inshore, Matt's customers are finding good flounder fishing on ocean structure. Matt took some time last week to head to Russell's Reef where he and a buddy caught 6 nice flatties.

Capt. Bert at Hook'em &

Cook'em Tackle Shop in the Indian River Marina said that he had a few anglers catch their limit of flounder last week while fishing along the rocks in the Indian River Inlet. Flounder fishing isn't hot in the inlet, according to Bert, but it has improved.

Headboats fishing out of Indian River found mixed results for flounder fishing on ocean structure, but the one thing that has been consistent is the number of throwbacks that are being caught. However, patience is rewarded, like on Friday, when the full-day headboat, "Capt. Bob" returned with 48 keepers.

Offshore, the bite is slow right now. Anglers looking for tuna have mostly been chunking in Massey's Canyon at the 12 Fathom Lump. Billfish action is scattered with fish caught in the Wilmington and Baltimore Canyons. Dolphin are all over with some of the bigger fish coming in from the Poor Man's Canyon.

t used to be that regulations for bluefin tuna and flounder were always in such a constant state of turmoil that each spring anglers were constantly on the edge of their seats waiting to find out what the new catch and creel limits were going to be that season. Proposals would be public made, meetings scheduled, letters written and through it all it was not uncommon for fishermen to get more than a little hot under the collar about the way it would all work out in the end.

These days it seems as though things have leveled off enough for those species that there's not as much stickershock going on each spring when the new tuna or flounder regulations are announced. But it's not quite that way for sharks, which have become the new "problem child" for marine managers trying to strike a balance between effective fishery management and happy fishermen.

It wasn't too long ago that shark fishing regulations were so simple that few anglers had to ask or even worry so much about what they legally could or couldn't keep if they wanted to bring one home for dinner. For the most part, it was simply

one shark a day at 54-inches and a few species that were prohibited. But considering that off Delmarva alone we have about 14-species of relatively common sharks, all of which have their own unique biology, habits, travel patterns, life history and fishing pressure, it's become obvious that one set of rules to cover all sharks just doesn't cut it anymore. Such diversity among the different types of sharks is why these days marine managers are employing more "species specific" management practices when dealing with sharks.

species This specific approach is why we now have separate and unique size limits sharks mako for and hammerheads, а comprehensive list of prohibitive species, a fishing season that doesn't open for many species until July 15, the required use of hooks circle and the requirement to have a shark endorsement on one's annual HMS permit. If you want to fish for sharks these days you'd better have your ducks in a row!

Because the populations of some of the shark species commonly caught and released by local anglers are determined to be so critically low, fisheries has determined that an increased level of conservation is needed to protect them from the post-release mortality that occurs as a result of the catch and release fishery. Therefore, the intent of the some of these regulations is to help provide sharks the "best" chance of surviving encounters with recreational anglers.

In efforts to help provide additional conservation to local sharks and bring state regulations more in line with those that apply to anglers fishing in federal waters (more than 3-miles out), Maryland's Department of Natural Resources is considering some changes to state recreational shark fishing regulations. One of these changes will be that (just as it is in Federal waters) anglers who are fishing for sharks in state waters will be required to use non-offset, nonstainless steel circle hooks. With studies showing that the use of circle hooks greatly decreases the chances of a shark being hooked anywhere but in the jaw, that one regulation alone will go a long way to ensure that a lot less sharks will die from internal injuries caused from being hooked in the gut.

Maryland DNR is also planning to put on the books a regulation that prohibits anglers from removing sharks from the water that are going to be released. This same regulation is already in effect in Federal waters, so just like the

requirement for the use of circle hooks, in this case all they are extending doing is the requirement to cover state waters as well. This regulation applies to all sharks that are being released, not just those that are on the prohibited species list or are undersize. So, in other words, even if you "could" keep it if you wanted to, but choose not to, the shark must be released in the water by either cutting the leader or using a de-hooking tool to pop out the hook.

From a boat it's pretty obvious what they mean by "not remove a shark from the water", but beach fishermen are sometimes confused by what exactly constitutes being in or out. I've heard some say that "in the water" means still floating and not in contact with the bottom, while others contend that being in a couple inches of water would have them in compliance and others claim that it's OK as long as the fish is still on wet sand. I expect DNR will clarify what constitutes being "in" or "out" of the water when they put this law on the books.

Don't sit your fat butt on the shark! Yea - I know, that sounds kind of stupid, but navigate you're way through enough social media photos and you will find plenty of stupid people doing stupid things with sharks and that includes "sitting" on them for photos prior to release. If hauling them



out of the water wasn't bad enough (and will soon be illegal) sitting on a shark that's out of the water increases the chances for internal injuries that could kill the animal. Apparently DNR takes such stunts serious enough that the ridiculous practice will be addressed in the new regulations.

So that's what's coming down the pike in the way of Maryland new state regulations. On the Federal side, one thing concerning sharks is going to happen this fall and winter that won't really be a "change" in regulations as an "official much as continuance" of what we fished under this season.

If you recall, this season we fished under a new 83-inch minimum size limit for mako sharks. An 83-inch mako is roughly a 200-pound fish, so the size limit has made it extremely difficult for anglers to land a keeper size mako - something not too many folks have been happy about. That size limit came into effect after an emergency ruling this winter by

National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS). Emergency rulings are temporary and this one will end in late August. But before any fishermen get their hopes up that the size limit is going to revert back to 54inches, let me say that it's not. NMFS will file for an extension on the emergency rule, which will give them enough time to make the 83-inch size limit permanent. If passed, this new regulation will show up as an amendment to the current fishery management plan for sharks, so get used to the 83inch limit - it's not going away anytime soon!

So even though between now and next season there will be a lot of new regulatory stuff going on concerning sharks, for the most part there's no real earth-shattering changes that are drastically different from the way anglers are able to fish right now - uh, unless you like to sit on sharks!

What time is it?

Congratulations to the all of the participants and winners of this year's White Marlin Open. The challenge of running offshore for consecutive days in all weather conditions is a lot of work for the crew, and catching a prize winning fish is even more difficult. Great job to all!

We wish all crew and anglers good luck in The MidAtlantic next week.

Let's review a popular topic during fishing tournaments - time of day.

While many crew members do not wear a while watch fishing, keeping track of the correct time is even more critical during a tournament. With so many electronic gadgets supplying the time, we expect it to be correct and synchronized between all devices. А marine chartplotter or GPS, as with most modern timekeeping devices, it needs to be properly programmed to

your location for the proper time zone and the use of day light savings time. Many of us on a boat have come to rely on the time displayed on the chartplotter or related device for being the proper time.

How does a GPS chartplotter know the correct time?

Chartplotters receive the time from GPS satellites. In addition to longitude, latitude, and altitude, the Global Positioning System (GPS) provides a critical fourth dimension - time. Each GPS satellite contains multiple atomic clocks that contribute very precise time data to the GPS signals. GPS receivers decode these UTC signals, to the standard, and effectively GPS synchronize each receiver to the world's atomic clocks. This enables users to determine the exact time to within 100 billionths of a second, without the cost of owning and operating atomic clocks.

The manufacturers of

GPS receivers these generally automate the device's time settings, allowing it to be automatically adjusted based on your GPS location, just like a smart phone. Seems like a good idea, right? Well many of the devices may be too smart. They know when your boat moves into a different time zone or time of year and even when it has exceeded the coastal 12-mile territorial waters of the USA. Once beyond the 12-mile coastal limit, the chartplotter often automatically eliminates the savings daylight time (subtracting one hour in the summer) on the way to the distant fishing grounds and then adding back the one hour on the return trip to port, at that same 12-mile territorial water limit.

The best way to deal this issue with and synchronize the vessels time to the same time zone at is to manually port, configure the time zone (or offset) of your GPS display systems. Often, the time of day menu on the chartplotter has a setting for display format and offset adjustment from UTC. Keeping the same time at

sea and at port will also allow your calculated ETA to be correct. Here in Maryland during the summer, the time zone is -4 (minus 4 hours) from UTC.

The Garmin chartplotter seem to need devices manual time zone configuration more than other brands since they default to the automatic time zone settings for simplicity. The steps below are for the popular most current Garmin devices. Other brands may be similar.

•Start from Home screen

- •Select Configure/Setting
- Select Preferences
- Select Units
- Select Time
- •Select Time Zone
- Select Custom

GMT or UTC?

Many of us once referenced time based on Greenwich Mean Time (GMT).

GMT is actually a time zone in England that also happens to be the same as UTC. The Universal Time Coordinated (UTC) is an international standard referenced around the world. UTC is an atomic timescale; it usually has 86,400 seconds per day but is

kept within 0.9 seconds of the mean solar time by the introduction of occasional leap seconds. If you are curious, there are currently 37 worldwide time zones, with some zones having 30 or 45 minute intervals as compared to the traditional 1 hour differentials based on 1 hour per 15 degrees longitude.

If you are using a digital video camera or still camera (especially in tournaments), be sure you check and set the devices time so the images timestamp is correct with the time zone and season.

Setting your ships clocks and devices to the correct time will allow you to be sure you start and stop fishing at the correct time, fill out the catch reports properly and have the correct estimated time of arrival (ETA) for your trip.
