

Warmer than average water temperatures off the coast of Maryland delayed the typical arrival of migrating striped bass for weeks and the schools that did move through the area were mainly outside the 3-mile limit, frustrating Maryland striper snipers well into mid-December. Although the number of fish hooked was down, some nice size stripers were landed, led by Dave Kasey's 51.5-inch, 52 lb. lunker caught while tossing fresh bunker from the surf off Assateague Island in early December. Dave's catch just nudged out Scott Slater's 51 pounder for heaviest striped bass of the year. Scott's linesider was also caught off Assateague Island in December (see page 4).



I didn't realize how many readers like to look back on the season to see what was caught and when certain species arrived on the scene.

Issue dates are in bold.

May 4, 2011 - Nasty weather ruined most of the spring fishing... Flounder fishing was good in the Thorofare and north of the Rt. 90 Bridge... Flounder are fat!... Good striper bite around the Rt. 50 Bridge at night ... Tautog fishing on ocean wrecks and reefs has been outstanding ... Black drum bite off Assateague has been going strong for a month... The "Wrangler" took a trip to between the Washington and Norfolk Canyons and caught the first make shark and first bluefin tuna of the season... First flounder of the year was caught by Tommy Fowler on April 17th... In Delaware, flounder fishing was decent in Massey's Ditch... Striper, tautog and bluefish bites are heating up in the Indian River Inlet (IRI)... Temperatures rose in the Lewes Canal which improved flounder fishing... Dennis Muhlenforth caught a 20 lb. 4 oz. tautog while fishing on the "Morning Star" ... Scott Allison caught a 19 lb. 8 oz.

tautog on an ocean wreck.

May 11, 2011 - Tautog fishing was the star of the week ... First sheepshead of the season was caught at Winter Quarter Shoal ... Striper bite was sporadic... Rt. 50 bite was hot and cold, but when it was hot it was really on ... Several stripers over 40-inches were caught off Assateague Island... Head boats continue to return with nice catches of cod... Water temps getting into the 60's... In Delaware, flounder fishing improved in the IRI... Tautog fishing was good at the Outer Wall in the Delaware Bay before the season closed on May 12th... Delaware beaches gave up some nice size stripers... Black drum turned on in the Delaware Bay, particularly off Slaughter Beach... Jerry Scruggs caught a 17 lb. tautog at the Star Wreck...

May 18, 2011 - Larger flounder showed up in the Thorofare and behind Assateague Island... There were a lot of throwback flounder being caught... Snapper bluefish were thick around the Rt. 50 Bridge... Striper bite was hot off the beaches... Black drum bite off Assateague was still going strong... In Delaware, flounder fishing was good in the VFW Slough, Massey's Ditch and along the edge off Burton's Island... The soon to be "epic" striper fishing in the IRI started...





Daytime black drum bite was good off Slaughter Beach and at the Coral Beds... Flounder bite was good in the Lewes Canal... David Cropper released a 52-inch red drum at a VA barrier island..


May 25, 2011 - The incredible striper bite in the IRI continued at a fever pitch... Surfcasters continued to do well catching stripers... South Jetty turned on for stripers... Snapper bluefish were caught around the Rt. 50 Bridge during the last of the incoming tide... Chopper bluefish were caught at the Jackspot and the Fingers... Sea bass season opened with good results at the Jackspot, African Queen and Great Eastern Reef... Good flounder bite around the Rt. 90 Bridge, the Thorofare and Commercial the Harbor... "Nontypical" boated a 214.5 lb. mako shark in the Baltimore Canyon... Blue sharks were thick offshore... a 14.8 lb. bluefish at the Fingers... June 1, 2011 - On May 29th,

the first white marlin was caught outside the Rockpile... Boats returned with good catches of yellowfin tuna from around the Rockpile, led by 40 on the "Marli"… The "Grandé Pez" boated a 115 lb. bigeye tuna around the 461 Lump... Big bluefish were caught at the Hambone... Snapper bluefish still thick around the Rt. 50 Bridge... A 470 lb. thresher shark was caught at the Fingers... Mako sharks were caught in 60-degree water at the Fingers... Excellent striper bite around the South Jetty, but many were too small to keep ... Sea bass fishing was very good on ocean wrecks and reefs... Not many keeper flounder were caught... Surf fishing slowed... In Delaware, striper fishing in the IRI died off and fish were smaller... Flounder fishing in the back bays slowed... Stripers, black drum and bluefish were caught in the surf... Croakers showed up in the surf along Broadkill Beach... Stripers were landed on cut bunker at the Roosevelt Inlet... First dolphin and wahoo were caught on May 22nd in the Lindenkohl Canyon... Ricky Herbert caught a 6 lb. 4 oz. sea bass at a natural ocean reef... Hobby Isaacs caught a 5 lb. 10 oz. sea bass at Reef Site 11... Bob Spetzler caught an 8 lb. 8 oz. flounder in the East Channel... Rob Johnson caught a 224 lb. mako at the Jackspot...

June 8, 2011 - Yellowfin tuna showed up in 60-100 fathoms in the Wilmington Canyon... Small makos were caught inshore... Bluefins were abundant around the Hambone and Sausages... Big thresher sharks were caught at the Fingers... Mako sharks were

caught at the Hambone and in Washington the Canyon... Dolphin were hooked in the Washington Canyon early in the week and in the Baltimore Canyon later in the week... Anglers caught a large number of throwback flounder behind Harbor Island and in the East Channel... Most keeper flounder were caught on Gulp! Swimming Mullets in the East Channel, the Thorofare and behind the OC Airport... First weakfish was caught off 4th St. Bulkhead... Striped bass continue to hang around the Rt. 50 Bridge and South Jetty... Surf fishing off Assateague slowed after the incredible striper run... Bluefish caught at the Hambone, Fingers and Sausages... In Delaware, flounder fishing in the Indian River and Rehoboth bays was good during the outgoing tide ... Some sea bass were caught between "DA" and "DB" Buoys... Flounder were caught in good numbers at the Old Grounds and in the IRI... Zak Smith caught a 280 lb. mako in the Washington Canyon... Dolphin fishing was outstanding near the Rockpile... Tuna bite was dead... Flounder action was still hot, although the throwback ratio was still very high ... The East Channel and the Thorofare were the hot spots for keeper flatties... Red drum were hooked a mile off Assateague near the Mud Hole... Plenty of sea bass were found on ocean structure... In Delaware, fishing was hit-or-miss... Flounder, croaker and bluefish were caught in the back bays... A few stripers were hooked in the IRI and in Massey's Ditch... Flounder and croaker were caught at the Old Grounds and at Sites #10 and #11... Sea bass action was good between "DA" and "DB" Buoys... Snapper bluefish were plentiful in the surf... The Lewes Canal produced good catches of striped bass... triggerfish Tautog, and sheepshead were caught at the Outer Wall in the DE Bay... Gary Ebling caught an 11 lb. 6 oz. flounder at the Old Grounds on cut bait...Georgia Touloumes caught a speckled trout in the Fenwick Ditch... Bob Spetzler landed a 9 lb. flounder off the 2nd St. Bulkhead.

Oct. - Dec., 2011 - It hasn't been the best fall for weather, with many windy days keeping anglers at the dock ... An excellent year of billfishing ended very strong with good numbers of white marlin releases being recorded through the beginning of October The bite started in the Baltimore Canyon in late September and moved to the Washington Canyon in early October... On September 24th, the "Marli" returned with a 112 lb. white marlin that was caught in 80 fathoms near the Rockpile... Yellowfin tuna action was decent through the 3rd week in October when boats caught fish on the chunk in the Spencer and Wilmington Canyons... On November 8th, anglers trolling

www.coastalfisherman.net Stretch's at the 2nd Lump for bluefish hooked into a 100 lb. bluefin tuna... Some dolphin were caught in the Wilmington Canyon towards the end of October... The keeper flounder bite in the bay started to peter out very early in October and even the historically good ocean wreck and reef bite never really materialized... A lot of throwback flounder were caught in the East Channel up until the end of October... Once again, Tommy Fowler caught the last flounder of the year on November 28th at the Isle of Wight Shoal...The fall tautog bite was outstanding around the South Jetty and along the rocks off Martha's Landing ... Fall sea bass fishing was outstanding on ocean structure... Weakfish showed up in better numbers than we have seen in vears on wrecks and reefs close to the beach... With water temperatures remaining a warm 53-55 degrees, the Indian River/Maryland bluefish and striper bite was horrible with fish never really showing up in mass inside the 3-mile line through mid-December... A few small pockets of fish were seen off Sea Colony and as far south as the MD/VA line... Most larger schools of striped bass were seen around the 1st and 2nd Lump and sometimes as far out as the 3rd Lump... In Delaware, the sheepshead bite in the Delaware Bay was outstanding around the Outer Wall and Ice Breakers... In late October, Randy Jensen caught a new DE state record sheepshead weighing 15.5 lbs. at the Ice Breakers... Black drum were caught around Brown Shoal... Towards the end of October, stripers started being picked off at the mouth of the Delaware Bay at Overfalls Shoal and in The Valley. Fish weren't thick, but they were big, with several weighing over 40 lbs... Anglers had good luck trolling Stretch lures and tandem rigs... Better numbers of fish showed up at the beginning of December with periodic waves of stripers throughout the month... The bite off the beach, all the way up to central New Jersey was good, so at press time we continued to hope for a good fall striper season.



Driftin' Easy

"I want to go fishing on a "party boat!"

In the old days people used to call these large ocean going vessels "head boats" because the captain took a fairly large group of anglers out into the ocean to go "bottom fishing." When you call around to find information about a trip or to make a reservation, keep in mind that a charter boat takes approximately 6 people while a party boat takes 25-70 people. Obviously the cost of going on the party boat is much less than a charter boat.

"How much does a party boat cost to go out into the ocean?"

The full day boats range from \$60 to \$125 per person. Half-day trips run approximately 25 30 to percent less. You definitely get more for your "bang" on a full-day trip because the boat can go out further and you get more fishing time. It usually takes at least an hour to get to the fishing grounds, BUT, if you are fishing with a child or a first time angler that wants to "test the waters" to see how it feels to be in the ocean, the half-day trips are for you! The boat ride alone is worth the money! (Hint: Some of the boats offer coupons online or in the Coastal Fisherman)

Party boats frequently take



special long trips that cost more (usually between \$85 and \$125) and can last 10 hours, and even occasionally 18 hours (around \$200)! Be sure you know the length of the trip you are on and make reservations in advance. Keep in mind that most party boats ask that you get to the boat a half an hour before departure. Think about that the night before and go to bed early and leave the partying alone!

"What should we take?"

Clothes! In the spring and fall you can usually bet that the air temperatures on the water are cooler than the land temperatures. Lavered clothing is always a good idea. You can always peel some layers off. In the heat of the summer, carry a lightweight, long sleeve shirt to cover your arms if you get chilly or get sunburned. If the wind is from the west little black flies can follow you miles offshore. I carry my lightweight, long pants and some bug spray. I hate those pesky, biting flies.

I have a lightweight rain suit I always carry with me. If it rains, I have a rainsuit and if it gets cold it serves as a windbreaker! OK, now I realize I'm a little older and am very careful about the sun and keep my legs, neck and arms covered up. (I like to



wear a gaitor around my neck to protect the back of my neck.) If you want to get a little sun, keep in mind that the sun's rays reflect off the water and you can get sunburned a lot quicker on a boat than you can laying on the beach. Carry sunscreen of some sort, (a tan looks nicer than a burn!) lip protection, a hat, and really important, a pair of good sunglasses.

Now, if you have never been on the ocean, it's a good idea to take some sort of motion sickness pill with you such as Dramamine, Bonine, or Marazine. Most of these companies have chewable pills that you can take at the first sign of feeling queasy. I also carry in my bag some pretzels or saltines and a ginger ale in case I start feeling the ocean waves. (Yes, I get seasick and I always take a Marazine one hour before I go fishing offshore.) You can also check with your doctor to get a prescription for either The Patch (Transderm Scop) or Meclizine. Both work really well.

Boots! Some boats are wetter than others, but in cold weather, I wear a pair of waterproof boots as opposed to a pair of tennis shoes. Otherwise, be careful when the boat backs up when getting ready to anchor. A pair of wet tennis shoes on a cold day is miserable! Also, watch out for waves coming over the side when moving if it's rough.

"Should we carry food and drinks? Can we take a couple of beers?"

Again, every boat is different. Some party boats have a galley and you can buy food and beverages. Other boats offer nothing! When you call the boat to make a reservation, which is highly recommended, ask what the boat has to offer. Some boats have a liquor license and you are not allowed to bring your own beer, while other boats do not have a liquor license and then it is OK. (Hint: Always carry cans or plastic bottles as www.coastalfisherman.net

opposed to glass bottles. Never, ever carry a banana aboard a boat! It's considered bad luck and someone, believe me, someone will be offended and blame you if fishing is slow or there is engine trouble or it rains or anything!!!!)

Ice! Carry a bag of ice and a medium-sized cooler. If you catch a couple keeper fish, it's good to keep them cool.

What other items should I take?

-Definitely a rag!

-A pair of pliers and/or some kind of tool to cut line.

- An array of sinkers in the 3 to 8 ounce range if you have them. Otherwise, you can buy them on the boat.

-Hooks and/or rigs if you prefer. Kahle hooks in sizes 3/0 or 4/0 on monofilament dropper loops are what most party boats use for bottom fish. If you have no idea about rigs, let the mate rig you up!

-Berkley Gulp, curl tail grubs or other trailers or teaser tails to help attract the fish (usually chartreuse or white)

-Fluorocarbon leader around 40 lb. test if you prefer to use that rather than the monofilament leader material supplied on the boat

"Where do I call to make a reservation?"

Almost all the local party boats advertise in the Coastal Fisherman and a phone number will be provided. Party boats run out of a marina and usually anglers marina call the for information and to make reservations unless there is a special "reservation" line that you need to call. You can also do a Google search for the boat. Make sure you add the city and state where the boat is located to your search. You will find that most party boats have current websites with information and phone numbers as well.

Now! Down to serious business!

"What is the best time of year to fish on a party boat!" Follow the seasons Sea

bass is the number one fish of choice for anglers to fish for. These fish are regulated in federal waters, so any time the season is open is a good time to go. Spring (May/June), late summer (end of August/Sept) and fall (Oct/Nov) are the very best times to fish for sea bass. Long trips in December are also good.

Some anglers love to fish for tautog. Spring and fall is also a good time to fish for tautog, but you need to watch your seasons and see when tautog season is open. Tautog are regulated by the states, so Delaware and Maryland seasons can be different.

Flounder are caught offshore on the party boats and they bite best from midsummer into early fall.

Croaker are popular fish for the half-day boats to fish for. These panfish generally bite best in late July, August, and into early September.

Triggerfish are also popular for anglers on halfday boats. These fish bite anytime during the summer.

Cod have come back to us and these fish generally bite best in the early part of the season and anytime the boats go out on long trips.

Tilefish also bite on long trips.

"Should we bring our own rods and reels?"

Bring your own rods and reels if they can handle 4 to 6ounces of sinker weight on a regular trip and 6-8 ounces on a long range trip. Otherwise, the party boats all have rental rods and reels. Most rental rods are the conventional type, so if you are not familiar with them, let the mate show you how to use them, and listen carefully!

"Should I bring my own bait?"

A lot of people like to have an "edge" and carry something special. If you are targeting flounder, bring along some Berkley Gulp! and maybe a pack of shiners. Any kind of fresh strip bait is always good for flounder.

If it is summer and you

really want to try for a tautog and the boat is targeting sea bass, you may want to carry along some sand fleas or green crabs. Call and ask what bait the boat has to offer. If the boat is only using squid, you can bring some clam. If the boat is only using clam, you may want to carry some squid.

"What's the best spot to fish from on a party boat?"

Most anglers like either the bow or the stern, with the stern being the most popular. The corner of the stern is probably the most coveted because you can cast out without tangling other patrons. I like the bow too, because you can cast out, but if it is a rough day, it can get bouncy up there and then it's a little more difficult to fish!

"What are the keys to a successful trip?"

First of all, if you want to learn and become successful it is important to listen to the captain and mate and follow their suggestions. If they see that you are really trying to learn the techniques, they will offer you more advice and tell you their little secrets. If you are "hard headed" and won't listen, they will leave you alone! (Tipping the mate well will also help you out in this department.) Remember, they are out there day after day, year after year. They know how to catch fish.

When you are flounder fishing and they tell you to twitch the rod tip, twitch the rod tip! When you are tautog fishing and they tell you not to move the sinker off the bottom, do just that. If the sea bass are biting "funny" and the mate tells you to let slack in your line and let the bait sit on the bottom, do what he says! If the party boat is on extremely snaggy bottom and the captain says to keep the sinker a few inches off the bottom, do just that. When the captain says to keep your bait fresh and change it periodically, please don't leave that old washed out piece of meat on the hook! When the mate shows you how to hook the clam and put the yucky dirty part of the clam at the very point of the hook, pay attention, he's letting you in on an important secret!

"Is there party boat etiquette?"

There's a lot to say about party boat etiquette if you fish the boats a lot. Show up early so the boat can leave if everyone is on board. Pay attention to your rod and use enough sinker weight so you don't tangle with your neighbor. Be friendly, but don't talk someone's ear off. Don't be rude, loud, get drunk or cuss around children. Don't let Capt. Monty on the Winter 2012 Coastal Fisherman Page 31

"Morning Star" catch you with a handheld GPS! Tip the mate! Don't grumble that the captain or mate don't know what they are doing, and never say, "At home, we do it this way..." When the mate tells you you are hung on the bottom, believe him, it's not a big fish! And please, leave those bananas at home!

Most of all have fun! Good fishing....



Today, shark fishing is

In 1974, Peter Benchley wrote the novel "Jaws". In the summer of 1975, the movie was released and ran for 9 months, breaking all existing records for the movie industry. Across America, a new heightened awareness and fear of sharks was erupted. In fishing communities along the coast, something else stirred. The main character, Quint (based on real life shark legend, fishing Frank Mundus) inspired an entire young generation of shark fishermen.

Since the summer of 1975, shark fishing has gone through a fair amount of



change and refinement. Back then, most of the shark fishermen wanted to be Capt. Quint, and as a result, the Penn Tackle Company sold a lot of large 12/0 and 16/0 reels. Overall, massive tackle was used – large hooks, large cable, large baits, etc. After all, that's exactly what you need to catch a giant shark. Fortunately, reality sank in and there was a realization that most of the shark fishing to be done along the Atlantic coast was for species of sharks other than the Great White.



Thirty-five years later, shark fishing has become a standard part of the fishing season. The month of June has, for many years now, been the time when small boaters, as well as charter boats, can travel offshore and try to catch a shark.

For new boaters and those who are unfamiliar with offshore fishing, shark fishing

an intimidating venture. Keep in mind, in the early to mid-70's most of us had no prior experience in fishing for sharks. There were no books written about it, no Sportsman magazine articles to show us how to do it, and no local inch hook captains to guide us. For that matter, there was no Coastal

This is a basic list of what you will need to get started. You will certainly tweak this list as needed.

As to where and when to fish, shark fishing has changed little over the years. Around 15 years ago, there were quite a few shark fishermen who broke with the traditional 20 fathom area to fish and ventured further offshore in search of sharks. While they have had good success fishing in 50 fathoms and deeper, there are still plenty of sharks to be caught in 20 fathoms. Going further offshore does not necessarily make for a more successful trip. Keep in mind, the majority of sharks (particularly makos) have a migration that puts them off of our coast from late May through the end of June. These fish have been

following the same migratory route for thousands of years. Their migration coincides with the path followed by tuna, bluefish and false albacore. So, the bottom line is to try and find the bait. It could be in 100 fathoms, but it could also be in 20 fathoms.

The area known as the Fingers is the widely accepted shark fishing hot spot. Areas along the 20 fathom to 30 fathom breaks from Chincoteague to Cape May offer excellent haunts for Look for mako sharks. structure or edges where depth fluctuates water significantly. These hills and often help valleys to congregate the bait and sharks. Keep your eyes open for life. Sometimes the presence of other marine life is a good omen for sharking. Bait on the surface or on your depth finder, birds, breaking fish, sea turtles and ocean sunfish are all good signs of life.

Temperature is critical for

finding sharks. Typically, by the middle part of May when water temperatures are in the mid-50's, the first sharkers of the year will start fishing. While the water is still on the cool side, most of the catch is made up of blue sharks and bluefish. As we approach the 3rd or 4th week in May and water temps have climbed into the 60's, the first mako of the season is typically caught. As with any species of fish, sharks swim in water they feel most comfortable in. As a rule, 60-70 degree water temperatures are prime for mako sharks.

As of late, with the advent of sea surface temperature imaging, many captains predetermine where they will fish based on warm water eddies. Temperature breaks along the eddies have come to be just as important as depth changes. Don't overlook them!

Once you are at the fishing grounds, the boredom and excitement begins. Most

captains use frozen chum dispensed out of a chum bag or crate. Bunker oil and a slick dripper are sometimes used in combination to put out your slick. The general idea is to let the tide, current and wind be your captain. As you drift along, your chum will hopefully attract the sharks.

Placement of baits is typically in the chum line from the surface down to the bottom. The use of corks or balloons helps to suspend the baits at different depths so you cover the entire water column.

Now, it's a waiting game. Shark fishing for me has always been an exciting fishery. Some people may say that shark fishing is 8 hours of boredom punctuated by a 1/2hour of excitement. For me, it peaceful and the is anticipation of that first bite of the season, or of the day, is what keeps you waiting patiently. In what other fishery can a small boat get the opportunity to fish a large fish relatively close to the Inlet? If Winter 2012 Coastal Fisherman Page 57 you haven't shark fished, give it a try. There is plenty of information out there. Capt. Mark Sampson has written a great book on shark fishing and it is available at local tackle shops. Mark has pioneered the local shark fishery and runs the Ocean City Shark Tournament at the Ocean City Fishing Center each June. He typically is more than willing to spend some time and give advice to novice anglers. Elsewhere, local tackle shops and marinas can help get you started in your new endeavor.

Since "Jaws" set the wheels in motion, some things have changed. A few fads have come and gone, but shark fishing is still basically the same – a little bit of peace and boredom with quite a bit of excitement. Get out there and give it a try!



2 stalks celery, including tops, cut into strips
2 carrots, cut into strips

2 tsp. salt

Add vegetables and seasonings, then add the water, barely covering the bass.







So Sonny, you've got yourself a boat, figured out how to catch a fish or two, and now you think you might just go ahead and get yourself a license and become a full-fledged charter boat captain. Are you sure that you've got what it takes? Do you really know what you might be getting yourself into? Do you even know what you need to do to get all the licenses and permits you'll need before you can open your doors for business? Hopefully, the following will be a useful guide for anyone contemplating a career in the charter boat industry.

Captain's License - It goes without saying that anyone who wishes to be a charter fishing boat captain needs to have a license from the U.S. Coast Guard that will allow them to carry passengers for

hire. Some folks, however, might not be aware of all that's involved in getting that license. As apparent by the number of licensed captains running around the docks these days, getting a license doesn't require the IQ of Einstein or half a century of experience working on the water. But then again, the qualification, testing, and documentation requirements for applicants are rigorous enough to weed out some who maybe shouldn't be in the industry in the first place and lend a certain level of credence to anyone who is.

Captain's licenses, which the Coast Guard now refers to as "Merchant Mariners Credentials", are assigned in a number of different grades with the first (entry level) being an "Operator of Uninspected Passenger Vessels" (OUPV). This is commonly known as a "6-pack" license because it limits the holder to taking no more than six passengers at a time. The next grade above an OUPV license is a "Master's" license, which allows a captain carry more than six to passengers on vessels that have been inspected and approved by the Coast Guard to carry the extra load. A master's license is sometimes referred to as a "tonnage license" because it specifies the maximum gross tons of a vessel the licensee is permitted to operate. Local captains commonly hold fifty, or one hundred gross-ton licenses.

Sea Time - One qualification for a captain's license is that of days at sea which are listed as "sea-service". To qualify for an OUPV license, mariners must document at least 360-days of sea service, or for a Master's license they must show 720days. Sea service can go back in time as far as necessary but 90days of it must have occurred in the last three years.

Licenses are also divided between Near Coastal (inside and outside the inlet) and Inland (inside the inlet only). To qualify for a Near Coastal license an applicant must have served at least 90 of their days outside the inlet.

Physical - Prospective captains must see a doctor for a physical exam, the results of which must then be reviewed and approved by the Coast Guard. In recent years the Coast Guard has tightened the physical requirements for both new and renewing applicants creating problems for some who have anything but a total clean bill of health.

Drug Testing - Applicants must take and pass a drug test if they wish to get a captain's license. The results of this test must be submitted to the Coast Guard in the application package on the appropriate CG form. Applicants who are currently enrolled in an approved random drug testing program and who have not failed or refused to take a drug test, may, in lieu of taking another test, supply a written statement from the drug testing they company that are members in good standing.

CPR/First Aid - The Coast Guard requires that all applicants for a captain's license attend and pass an approved CPR and First Aid course such as those offered by the American Red Cross.

TWIC Card - All licensed captains must have а Transportation Worker Identification Credential, also know as a "TWIC card" and anyone applying for a captain's license must have at least applied for one. Currently the fee for this identification card is \$132.50 and they are good for five years. Applicants must apply in person to a TWIC Enrollment Center, the closest of which to Ocean City is in Salisbury. More information is available at

TWICinformation.com.

Testing - Besides qualifying for a Coast Guard license, every prospective captain must pass a written examination. The test is not easy; it's long, requires a relatively high score to pass and covers rules of the road, safety, boat handling, navigation and plotting. Much of the test involves many questions on information and situations the average recreational boater might never encounter in their boating career - but ones that the Coast Guard thinks a licensed captain should know. Even skippers with a lot of time on the water will usually find it necessary to crack the books and study hard to pass. Some people never do.

For many, one of most challenging sections of the test is "rules of the road" which involves questions on the actions between two vessels, lights, sound signals and day shapes. With 30 questions and a required passing score of 90% or better, someone can only miss three questions and still pass that part of the test.

Another section many find difficult is "plotting" which requires folks to physically plot-out courses, routes and locations on a paper chart. For hundreds of years, such tasks were commonplace on vessels of all sizes, but in these days with GPS' on every boat, plotting has become something a lot of mariners never learn that is, unless they need to pass a captain's exam!

Anyone who qualifies can go to the Coast Guard's Regional Exam Center in Baltimore and sit for the exam, but these days a lot of prospective captains choose instead to take a course through an approved Captain's School that teaches them the material they need to know and also administers the test. Those who enroll in such schools must still learn all the same material and take the same tests as those who go on their own to the Coast Guard Exam Center, but many feel that professional training helps them to more easily learn and (most importantly) "retain" what they've been taught long after the testing period. Much information about more captains licenses and accredited schools is available on the US Coast Guard website.

Got your license – now what?

So now that you've got your captains license you're all set and ready to launch into the charter fishing business. Right? Well – not so fast. If you're going to fish there are other state and federal licenses you'll need to acquire before you can legally start putting hooks in the water and hauling in a paycheck.

Maryland Guides License -Anyone who wishes to run a charter fishing or guide service in Maryland waters, which includes all the inland waters and out in the ocean to three miles offshore, must have a Commercial Tidal Fish License which can either be a "Resident Fishing Guides License (FGR), a Non-Resident Fishing Guides License (FGN), or an Unlimited Tidal Fish License (TFL). The state makes only a limited amount of these licenses available and there is a long waiting list to get one. It's not permitted for someone who has one of these licenses to sell it to someone else, but the state allows it to happen (hence the reason for the long waiting list) so those wishing to circumvent the waiting list can usually find someone who is going out of the business and willing to sell/transfer the license to them. The prices for a license can be many thousands of dollars. Fortunately most local captains fish only in federal waters (beyond three miles of the beach) so they do not need a Maryland guides license. These licenses are issued by the Maryland Department of Natural Resources.

Maryland Fishing License -In 2011 Maryland started requiring anglers to purchase a Chesapeake Bay and Coastal Sportfishing License to fish in Maryland coastal waters. Charter boat operators can purchase a license to cover up to six of their passengers for \$240, or pay \$290 for a license if they plan to carry more than six. These licenses must be purchased in person at a Maryland DNR Service Center such as the one in Salisbury (410-713-3840).

Vessel Operator Card - An "Operators Permit" is needed by anyone operating a federally permitted fishing vessel. This permit is issued by NMFS through either their Northeast Regional Office (978-281-9370 nero.noaa.gov) or their Southeast Regional Office (727-824-5326 sero.nmfs.noaa.gov). Applicants for this license will receive a laminated picture ID card that they must carry with them whenever they are fishing.

Multi Species Permit – This permit will allow charter and headboat operators to fish for a multitude of species including seabass, tautog, bluefish, flounder, squid, butterfish and so on. It can be obtained through the NMFS Northeast Regional office (978-281-9370 nero.noaa.gov).

HMS Charter/Headboat Permit - Most offshore anglers are quite familiar with The "Highly Migratory Species" permit. It (HMS) was previously known as a "tuna permit" but a few years ago the National Marine Fisheries Service changed it to also cover sharks and billfish. It's important that anyone carrying passengers for hire makes sure that they get the "HMS Charter/Headboat" permit AND NOT the "HMS Angling" permit which is intended for private recreational fishermen. This is a very quick and easy to online permit get (nmfs.noaa.gov/sfa/hms).

Dolphin Wahoo Permit - In addition to the HMS permit, all charter and headboat operators must also have a special permit to fish for, or land, dolphin and wahoo. Listed as the "Atlantic Charter/ Headboat for Dolphin/Wahoo" (or CDW) this permit is obtained through the NMFS Southeast Regional Office (727-824-5326 sero.nmfs.noaa.gov). Private fishermen who do not charter their boats do not need this permit.

Random Drug Testing Program - All active captains and their crew members (mates) then need to be enrolled in a Coast Guard approved random drug-testing program. Besides the paperwork and an annual fee, enrollment in such a program requires a trip to an approved medical facility to leave a "sample" for urineanalysis of illegal drugs. Afterwards, captains and mates

are subject to being called up at any time for random drug testing. In addition, any vessel that is more than 2 hours from a collection site that's capable of doing alcohol or drug tests is required to have an alcohol test device on board to administer to persons involved in an accident. Two approved and popular random drug program The companies include: Charterboat Consortium (nacocharters.org) and The Maritime Consortium (drugfreevessel.org).

Federal Documentation -Rather than having their boats registered with the state, those who own vessels of 5-gross tons or more and wish to carry passengers for hire must also ensure that that their boats are "federally documented". Instead of the common state registration numbers and decal up on the bow, such vessels will display the boat's name on both sides of the bow, and the vessel's name and homeport on the stern. Documenting a vessel is not as easy as filling out a couple of forms and dropping them off at the Coast Guard office, complying with this requirement can be a long and involved process that requires a lot of paperwork.

Marina Requirements -Often particular marinas will have specific requirements that charter captains or boats must meet if they wish to operate from their facility. These requirements may have to do with pricing structure, insurance coverage, upkeep of the boat, qualifications of the captain, co-op advertising fees, or whatever the marina deems necessary to properly manage their particular charter fleet.

Local Business Licenses – Depending upon where a vessel is tied up, towns or counties will sometimes require that charter operations have some sort of business license. When I use to operate down in the Keys it was more hassle to get a county "trash" certificate than it was to get a charter boat fishing license, but both were needed to do business there. Though local governments seldom provide charter operations the same benefits they might to an Winter 2012 Coastal Fisherman Page 69 average land-based business, they'll often find a way to tax them the same.

Charter Insurance – It goes without saying that good liability and hull insurance is critical in the charter business. You can be the safest captain in the world but "anything" can happen out there and even if you do nothing wrong, you can still end up in court and the right insurance can be a lifesaver. Insurance is different between pleasure and charter boats and a lot of insurance companies will not cover vessels carrying passengers for hire. It's a good idea to get hooked up with an agent who specializes in writing policies for charter boats and other commercial marine businesses.

OK, so now that you've got all the legal stuff taken care of, it's finally time to go fishing – or maybe not. I haven't yet touched on one of the most important aspects of the business and that would be "customers"! Customers are a pretty important part of any business and if anyone thinks all they need to do to draw

paying clients to their transom is a pretty boat and a couple of tournament wins, they need to wake up and smell the diesel fumes! If you haven't noticed, Delmarva has a gazillion charter boats, most of which are in pretty nice shape and are run by folks who are probably just as good as you or I at catching fish. Unfortunately, since there hasn't exactly been a surplus of charter "clients" in recent years, everyone is competing for what business they can grab from the limited market.

Effective marketing of a charter fishing business is, in a way, no different from most other businesses in that the promotions need to be seen by, and catch the attention of, the target audience (there's no need to run ads out in the mid-west because few people are going to come from that far away to go fishing), they should cultivate a desire for the product (get folks interested in going fishing), and they should show why one particular product is the one to choose (why they should choose your boat over all the others).

From TV ads to t-shirts, there's a million and one ways to promote a charter business these days and everyone has to figure out for themselves what works best for their own situation. There are, however, a few things in this business that are a "must-do" for folks who are serious about booking trips. The first is to realize that no matter what marina or dock they operate out of they will probably have to book most, if not all, of their own trips. These days with the internet it's too easy to get online and in a few minutes find out details about boats operating in the area you wish to go fishing, so not as many folks are inclined to just call a marina and ask to be set up on a boat. Instead they can easily contact the captain themselves and make all the arrangements. Captains who are content to sit around and wait for the dock office to book their boat are going to be doing a lot of sitting around all season.

Websites, have one! – Websites are no longer an option for charter boats anymore - they're a must! I know there are still a few dinosaurs out there who think stuff" "internet that is unnecessary and all they need to book trips is a telephone answering machine and a pack or two of brochures. But these days people "expect" to find legitimate businesses on the web and can be suspicious of ones that aren't represented there. Every charter boat should have its own website. It doesn't have to be huge, loud, interactive, and feature all the latest high tech features, the basic info found on any brochure is adequate. While it can be tough for an average guy who runs his own boat to compete against the advertising budgets of boats owned by fatcats or big corporations, a good looking website need not be expensive and can help to level the playing field by providing a clean and professional description of the business.

Phone calls, take em! -Included on every bit of promotional material should be all the contact information needed so that potential customers can reach you the quickest and easiest way. Remember, when someone decides they want to book a fishing trip they can pick your boat or any one of a thousand others. You've got to talk to them ASAP after they made that commitment and before they change their mind. There is never a moment that I don't have my charter (calendar) book with me so that at any time, day or night, if I get a call about a trip I can look at my schedule, see what's available, and book the trip. During the fishing season I'm seldom able to eat dinner without my home or cell phone ringing, but I never ignore a call because I know it could be the difference between sitting at the dock or getting paid to go fishing one day. Charter captains need to be accessible to their clients 24/7, and even though the calls often come at inconvenient times, the alternative is that they don't come in at all.

Email, use it! - When email first came out I wasn't too keen

on using it for correspondence with clients. It just seemed to me that I could cover more in a 5-minute phone call than I could in an email that took me 15-minutes to type out, not to mention that I'd then have to wait for a reply. I still prefer phone calls but at least with emails I can respond on my time (not in the middle of dinner) and I can archive the correspondence for future reference. Email also allows clients to correspond with me on their time (they have schedules too) instead of trying to coordinate a call when we are both available to talk. When you want to get a quick reminder out to clients that the fish are biting and you have open dates, using email as an alternative to direct mailings can save time, money and a lot of envelope licking. These days I book about half of my trips via email, and I'd like to thank all the charter boat captains who don't use email because I'm certain the rest of us are getting charters that you're the throwing away.

Coastal Fisherman, advertise in it! If you want the fishing community to know you have a legitimate charter operation that's open for business you absolutely have to be represented in this publication. There is no other fishing publication that even comes close to being read each week cover to cover by so many local fishermen (most and importantly) "wanna-befishermen" looking to book a charter boat. Considering the distribution and readership, the Coastal Fisherman is absolutely the best bang for the buck. And I'm not just saying that to keep the mean-old publisher from beating me up!

Obviously, there are a lot of "hoops" to jump through before someone can step into the business of taking people out fishing on a charter boat. It might not be easy to get through them all, but then again, maybe it's best that it isn't. Taking passengers out on the water is а huge responsibility that's not suited for just anyone who can drive a boat and bait a hook.

OK kid, you've passed the qualifying process, the testing, the physical, the paperwork shuffle, learned how to do CPR, stop severe bleeding and tie a clove hitch, chart a course from here to Bermuda, and even know what lights a tugboat should display if it's traveling down the Mississippi River. You have all your fishery permits, which means you probably also have Maryland DNR and at least two NMFS phone numbers memorized and their websites bookmarked on your computer, as well as an extra six inches of paperwork piled up on your desk. Your 14-year-old niece set you up with a first class website, you've got some brochures and business cards printed, and you even took out a quarter page ad in the "Coastal Fisherman". Finally, after all that, you're ready for the excitement, fame and fortune that comes from being a sportfishing charter boat captain!

I hate to end this article on a sobering note, but I would be remiss if I didn't point out that probably less than one percent of those who start a full-time charter fishing business actually succeed in making a living for themselves. What most captains eventually come to know is that all the aforementioned hurdles they had to overcome just to start running charters in the first place were actually the "easy" part of the business. The tough part comes after all that, when they realize the incredible time and expense involved in keeping the boat and equipment operating and booking enough charters to not only pay for all the business expenses, but also to finish off the season with enough money in the bank for the captain to pay his creditors, utility bills, put the kids through school and still have a little left over to put food on the table at the end of each day. It's a great occupation if you can make it work, many try - few succeed.





During the 2011 fishing season, the "Marli" had an outstanding year, landing 388 tuna, and first time the achievement had been accomplished in the month of May.



Each year, tackle manufacturers gather in Las Vegas to promote their wares at the International Convention of Allied Sportfishing Trades (ICAST). Winners are selected in several categories in addition to one product being selected "Best of Show".

In this column, we have highlighted a few of the winners.

BEST OF SHOW & BEST LINE

Pure Fishing, Inc. took home top honors in the "Best Line" category and was named "Best of Show" for their Berkley NanoFil fishing line. Berkley promotes the line as the next generation of fishing line that is not monofilament, not a braid and not fluorocarbon. The line is comprised of hundreds of "stronger-than-steel" Dyneema Nanofilaments that are molecularly linked and shaped into a unified filament line. The company boasts that the line has zero memory, zero stretch and has the thinest line by label rating of all Berkley fishing lines, making casting effortless and long.



The NanoFil line mainly comes in 150 (\$19.95) and 300 (\$38.95) yard spools in line weights ranging from 1 lb. to 12 lb. test. You can also buy 1,500 yard spools in 4-12 lb. test (\$179.95).

BEST BOAT

All you need to do is take a glance in to the bay and you will see that fishing from a kayak is really gaining in popularity.

"Best Boat" honors went to Hobie Cat for their Hobie Mirage Revolution 11 kayak. The Revolution 11 is a first of its kind, integrating the feel of a longer touring kayak with a shorter more maneuverable kayak. Measuring 11' 6" in length and weighing only 47 lbs., the boat is powered by Hobie's MirageDrive system where two pedals drive a pair of underwater fins.



With 5 colors and several setup options to choose from, the Revolution 11 is very customizable. Anglers will appreciate ample storage space, two molded-in rod holders and a livewell. If you are tired of paddling, the boat also comes with a sailing package.

MSRP on the basic Revolution 11 is \$1,749.

BEST HARD LURE

Prior to the fishing tackle company, Sebile being sold to Pure Fishing, Patrick Sebile was establishing a reputation in the industry for innovative products. Now under the umbrella of Pure Fishing, it looks like Sebile hasn't slowed down, capturing the "Best Hard Lure" category at ICAST for their D&S Crank.



The lure employs Sebile's Gravity Snagless Hook System that allows the hook to pivot on an internal pin, creating a snagless crankbait.

possibilities, the hook point remains inline with the baits tail during retrieval until a fish strikes, when the hook moves upward, freeing the point to penetrate the fish's mouth. The pivoting hook and tail on the body act to lock the fish's lip in place.

Depending on the model, the 2.75-inch crankbait runs between 1-4 feet below the surface and includes high pitch rattles to "create maximum clatter".

The Sebile D&S Crank comes in 9 different lip configurations in 7 colors and has an MSRP of \$14.50.

BEST SALTWATER REEL

Leave it up to Daiwa to borrow NASA fuel delivery technology when designing their Saltiga Spinning Reel that captured the Best Saltwater Reel category at ICAST. The Saltiga is designed for use with heavy braid when fishing for offshore gamefish.



The company claims that the magnetic oil changes shape when controlled by a magnetic field and forms a seal to prevent saltwater intrusion and less winding resistance. Their new Air Rotor design features corrosion-proof "Zaion" carbon construction to reduce weight offering while maximum strength.

The reel contains 14 ball bearings, а lightweight aluminum spool, an automatic rotor brake that keeps the rotor stationary when the bail is open and a machined aluminum handle arm with a 2-piece machined knob.

The Saltiga comes in 5 different models, all with a 5.1 to www.coastalfisherman.net

1 gear ratio. Maximum drags range from 22 lbs. to 66 lbs. and the largest reel can hold up to 440 yards of 80 lb. test line.

Prices range from around \$650 for the 3500 up to over \$1,100 for the 6500 model.

BEST TACKLE MANAGEMENT

Plano Molding Company, always a leader in the tackle box market, won the "Best Tackle Management" category with their new 4674 Hydro-Flo Tackle Bag.



If you fish in the rain or anywhere that your tackle bag would get soaked, the Hydro-Flo Tackle Bag may be exactly what you are looking for. The bag features a system that allows water to flow right through to the bottom, allowing the inside to dry naturally and keeping contents as dry as possible.

The base of the bag is impact resistant and has non-skid rubber feet to keep the bag stable in all conditions. With plenty of storage, the Hydro-Flo holds 5 Stowaway utility boxes and utilizes several side pockets for holding tackle and tools. Underneath the top cover is a clear, zippered pocket for storing soft plastics and charts. It even features two elastic tie-down straps for storing raingear or a jacket.

The bag measures 24" long by 13.5" wide and retails for around \$99.99.

Tautog Regulations are Changing in 2012



Maryland will be making adjustments to creel, minimum size and season in order to reduce the harvest by 49% as required by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC).

2012 Maryland Saltwater Fishing License Requirements

WHO NEEDS A LICENSE?

All persons fishing recreationally in the tidal waters of the State need a license, EXCEPT as follows: If a person:

- is less than 16 years of age
- is a registered angler with the State of Maryland and is fishing from a boat holding a valid tidal/salt water license issued by Maryland, Potomac River Fisheries Commission or the Commonwealth of Virginia
- possesses a valid commercial tidal fish license
- is fishing from a licensed commercial fishing pier
- is a registered angler with the State of Maryland and is fishing on a free fishing pier
- is the owner or the owners non-paying guest fishing from private real property or an attached pier in the Potomac River
- is fishing from a licensed charter boat
- is fishing on a free fishing day the first two Saturdays in June and July 4
- is a registered angler with the State of Maryland and possesses a Virginia Saltwater recreational fishing license
- possesses a Potomac River Fisheries Commission recreational fishing license
- Fishing in a designated free fishing area

FREE REGISTRATION REQUIREMENT FOR THOSE FISHING:

- On a boat with a current MD, VA, or PRFC Pleasure Boat Decal (also known as the Consolidated Bay & Coastal Sport Boat License), and are not licensed individually
- On MD salt and tidal waters with any VA recreational saltwater license
- On MD salt and tidal waters as a waterfront property owner or family member from your private property
- From private property or an attached pier on the tidal Potomac River, as an owner or a non-licensed guest
- At free fishing areas

Costa's Women's Collection took top honors in the "Best Eyewear" category at ICAST this past summer. The collection features 4 styles: Little Harbor (pictured bottom), Trippet, Islamorada and Hammock (pictured top). The nylon frame styles range from big-eye ovals to upswept rectangle shapes and come in black, tortoise, white and black/coral. All come with several possible lens options including Costa's famous 580 lenses. The sunglasses retail for between \$169 and \$249.

BEST FISHING ACCESSORY



The P-Line Sparrowhawk was selected as "Best Fishing Accessory" at the 2011 ICAST trade show. The pliers, made from machine cut aluminum, weigh only 2.1 ounces and measure just over 5 inches. The replaceable tungsten carbide cutters will cut braided line with ease, which most anglers know is not an easy task.

The Sparrowhawk pliers come with a nylon pouch and lanyard and retails for \$29.99.

It is estimated that over 20,000 boats are stolen annually. To combat this problem, inventors have come up with a product called the "Dock-N-Loc", an outboard lock that prevents theft by disabling the steering.



The newest model in the 3product line is the Dock-N-Loc PRO which is made of stainless steel with a polyarmour coating. It has a stainless steel, weather resistant lock, a reinforced and strengthened body when compared to previous models and comes with it's own storage bag. The Dock-N-Loc PRO mounts directly to the steering of an outboard engine and takes

just a minute to install. In addition to the PRO model, the company also offers the original Dock-N-Loc and the Dock-N-Loc SE for portable outboard engines.

The SE model retails for \$79 while the original model sells for \$99 and the PRO model lists for \$119.

Everyone knows that spooling your reel can be a pain in the neck. Getting the right tension, especially when spooling braided line is crucial to reel performance.

Berkley has come out with an inexpensive Mini Line Spooler that can accommodate a 1/4 lb. spool of line.

The Line Spooler clips onto any size rod, is made of weather resistant material and allows for adjustable tension on the spool.

It seems to me that the spooler was meant to be used on lighter, bay fishing rods (although the company doesn't state that) and is pretty easy to use. Just clip the spooler onto www.coastalfisherman.net your rod through the proper size opening. Attach the spool onto the tension rod and adjust to the desired tension. Tie the line onto your reel and load. Pretty easy.



The line spooler is also small enough to fit in your tackle box. It is also very affordable, with an MSRP of only \$9.99.

One final note - Please support our local tackle shops whenever possible. They are an extremely important part of our fishing community and I know they appreciate your business. Check with your local tackle shop on availability of all of these products. If they don't have it in stock, I'm sure they can get it for you in a very reasonable length of time.


